The Law of Love (Part 2) - Continued from OctoberScripture Reading: John 9-17 and 1 John 5:1-6Abiding in LoveThe reading in the Gospel According to John and the First Epistle of John go togetherlike a hand in glove. Jesus tells his disciples in the gospel to abide or remain in his love and that becomesthe theme of chapter 15. That is, the relationship of God and Jesus with one another and the relationshipwithin the community. It is a relationship of presence and mutuality. The Vine imagery used in the previousverses of John symbolizes how the life of the Christian community is shaped by love and intertwined withthe abiding presence of God in Christ.

Mirroring God's Love In verses 9 and 10 of the Gospel, Jesus explains that the Father's love for Jesus mirrors Jesus' love for his disciples. Jesus then asked the community to mirror that love in their own actions. When he says, in verse 12, "this is my commandment that you love one another as I have loved you," it is a restatement of what he said earlier in chapter 13, verses 34 and 35. But the extreme example of this is found in verse 13 where he says "no one has greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends" and this is what it means to love as Jesus loves. Jesus' death is the ultimate demonstration of his love. Jesus then defines friend and friendship by his own love. To be Jesus' friend is to love Jesus and be loved by him. Jesus ends that section with the commission to the community to go out and do works of love.

What Love Looks Like First John 5:1-6 continues the description of what love and faith look like and how they are required as proof of those born of God. Simply, everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God and, if you love the child, then you must love the parent. Of course, in our own lives, we have found that that is not always true. John, however, is talking about the divine relationship with humanity and, if we love the one who walked among us, then we will love the one who sent that emissary.

Beginning in verse one, John points out that what we believe about Christ shapes our understanding of love. The phrase Jesus is the Christ means that the Messiah came in the form of the historical figure Jesus.

In verse 2, John says that the proof of our love of humanity and of God is when we do the commandments of God in Christ. But don't be fooled, we're not talking about the 10 Commandments or the hundreds of legal statements found in the Hebrew Bible. We are talking about the one and only commandment given to us by Jesus, the commandment to love. Love God and love our neighbor.

Obedience is Not a Burden But, *John* continues, contrary to some groups against whom John and Paul debated, obedience is not a burden because obedience is done out of love and not out of obligation.

When I was young, my father would give me instruction and tell me "you can either do it because you love me or you can do it because I demand it." If I obeyed his instructions out of love, then it was not burdensome. And if I understood his instructions to be given out of love, then the love in me would respond to that.

Conquering the World And this is how we conquer the world—that the law imposed on us has lost its restraint and restriction because we are responding to God's law, to God's commandment and, if we follow the instructions of the Lord, then we have no worries about keeping any sort of religious or even civil law. Like we said last week, if we act entirely out of love, laws and commandments will go unbroken. That is as much true for civil law as it is for spiritual instruction.

So then, we conquer the world through our acceptance of the commandment of Jesus to love. Remember the way the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr explained it by saying, "Hate cannot drive out hate. Only love can do that." in another place, Reverend Dr. King declared, "I have decided to stick with love. Hate is too great a burden."

And there it is! Love removes the burden, the burden of law, the burden of hate, the very burden of being un-Christlike.

Some biblical interpreters want to say that it is our faith or even our doctrine that conquers the world. *John,* however, says that it is our belief that Jesus has come to bring God's love to us and who takes on that love and mirrors that love who can truly conquer the burdens of the world.

John concludes that passage by saying that Jesus came by water and blood. What he means is that Jesus was truly from God, truly identifying with God, and truly dying in order to show that no matter what we do, even crucifying the emissary of God, we cannot separate ourselves from the love of God. The presence of the Spirit of God in Christ and in us proves this to be true.

Mary the Brave: Mary the God Bearer

As a young pastor and working mom, I struggled with the challenges of balancing work and home life, often while carrying a child in my womb, arms, on my hip, in a front or back baby pack, or car seat. Now my children are adults, and I have the joy of watching them carry my grandchildren. They do it differently than I did, their car seats are much nicer than the ones we had.

but like us, they carry their children with much love. I still carry my adult children and grandchildren and will always carry them, in my heart with much love.¹ This Advent and Christmas season I'm reflecting on Mary, the God bearer. (In Greek it's Theotokos.²) Mary carried Jesus. Like all parents she carried her child with love, but she is also the God bearer. It was a brave thing Mary did to bear God into the world.

To love is a brave thing. It is a brave thing to become a parent. Mothers put their own lives at risk bearing a child in their womb and giving birth. It requires a measure of bravery for parents to bring a child into this world filled with the bad news of climate disasters, gun violence, war, political upheaval, racism, food/ water insecurity, and escalating health and higher education costs.

History has painted Mary to be quiet, meek and mild, submissive to God's will, but a closer read shows us that Mary was brave. Mary was neither meek nor superhuman.³ She had grit. She was faithful, courageous, strong and brave. Most of all, she was human. Her encounter with the angel Gabriel, the messenger of God made her brave. She knew that her pregnancy was dangerous and she could die giving birth. She also knew that as an unmarried teenaged mother it would cause upheaval in her family and community. She would give birth to Jesus during Roman occupation, a time of political unrest. Mary was brave. Her encounter with the living God made her brave.

Luke 1:26ff In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you... "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High,... the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God... For nothing will be impossible with God." Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

Her encounter with God gave her bravery and the faith to see that if God was

calling her God would also protect her. It revealed to her that God chooses the people on the margins, those overlooked and underestimated. Bearing God in the world was to bring good news and hope to those oppressed. May Mary, the God Bearer, inspire us all to be brave!

This Advent and Christmas season, I invite you to be Theotokos, God Bearers. I invite you to carry the good news of Christ's birth, life, death and resurrection to all those we meet on this journey of life and the love of Jesus in your hearts always. —Bishop Laurie Skow-Anderson
